About the Program

- New graduates can begin the SBL Nurse Residency Program in January or June, and will be hired full-time prior to completing the board examination. Those who do not pass their boards may work full-time in a care partner position.
- Required classes held the first month include: Basic Life Support, General Employee Orientation, Patient Care Continuum Orientation, Registered Nurse Orientation, Crisis Management Training, Cardiac Dysrhythmia, and other classes.
- Following the first month, the program consists of a four-hour monthly session for a year.
- Nurse Residents will complete and present a research project at the end of the year.

Focus

Through the Nurse Residency program, participants will:

Patient Safety

- Become competent in safety behaviors and error prevention tools
- Understand non-punitive reporting process
- Practice purposeful hourly patient rounding

Clinical Skills

- Partnering with a nurse on your unit to learn at the bedside
- IV Camp to master IV insertion skills

Stress & Time Management

- Develop conflict management skills
- Apply time management techniques to your current situation
- Apply life-management skills
- Apply goal-setting model
- Apply team goal setting and achievement skills.
