Introduction

Sarah Bush Lincoln (SBL), as a tax-exempt hospital system, must conduct a community health needs assessment (CHNA) every three years, as outlined by the Affordable Care Act and the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) Section 501(R). SBL is also required to adopt an implementation strategy to meet the community health needs identified through the CHNA.

As part of the CHNA, Sarah Bush Lincoln must:

- 1. Define the community it serves
- 2. Assess the health needs of the community
- 3. Solicit and take into account input received from persons who represent the broad interests of the community
- 4. Document the CHNA in a written report
- 5. Make the CHNA report widely available to the public

The following report is a summary of information collected in 2024 by:

- Soliciting input from community members via an online survey made available to the public via the hospital's social media accounts and website
- 2. Soliciting input from SBL employees and employees of area service agencies who have working relationships with SBL's Healthy Communities programs
- 3. Holding community meetings that were advertised and open to the public in each of the ten counties in SBL's service area to better understand the needs identified
- 4. Collecting responses to questions via community boards placed in public locations in its service area
- Collecting data via various reputable online resources such as the U.S. Census Bureau, County Health Rankings and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)

Sarah Bush Lincoln aligns its community health needs assessment with its triennial strategic planning process and uses the information to consider and address current community health needs in its strategic plan for the next three years.



Description of the Organization

Sarah Bush Lincoln (SBL) is a two-hospital system in east central Illinois. The main hospital, Sarah Bush Lincoln Health Center (SBLHC), opened its doors in 1977 to provide exceptional health care close to home for area residents. SBLHC is a 165-bed not-for-profit, rural community hospital, tax-exempt under 501(c)3 and governed by a community-based Board of Directors. SBL also owns and operates Sarah Bush Lincoln Fayette County Hospital (SBLFCH), a 25-bed critical access hospital located in Vandalia, Illinois. SBLFCH primarily serves the inpatient, outpatient and emergency health needs of residents of Fayette County, which is within SBL's 10-county service area.

SBLHC and SBLFCH are both accredited by The Joint Commission, the nation's oldest and largest standards-setting and accrediting body in healthcare. SBLHC has received numerous awards, including the Magnet Recognition Designation, the highest and most prestigious distinction a healthcare organization can receive for nursing practice and quality patient care. SBLHC was named a High Performing Hospital by the U.S. News and World Report for five areas of care - heart failure, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), pneumonia, hip fracture and back surgery (spinal fusion) and also received the 2025 Women's Choice Awards for Best Hospital in both Orthopedics and Outpatient Experience.

Sarah Bush Lincoln Health Center is one of four corporations organized under the not-for-profit parent corporation of Sarah Bush Lincoln Health System (SBLHS.) The other corporations are Sarah Bush Lincoln Health Foundation (SBLHF), which serves as the fundraising arm of the organization to generate philanthropic support for programs and services; Sarah Bush Lincoln Captive Insurance, Ltd., a wholly owned subsidiary providing primary general and professional liability coverage to SBLHS; and SBL Accountable Care Organization.


Service Area

Sarah Bush Lincoln Health Center is located between Charleston and Mattoon in Coles County, which is its primary service area. The secondary service area includes an additional nine counties: Clark, Cumberland, Douglas, Edgar, Effingham, Fayette, Jasper, Moultrie and Shelby.

Home health and hospice services cover an expanded region of five and ten additional counties, respectively. SBL operates provider clinics in Altamont, Arcola, Arthur, Casey, Charleston, Effingham, Martinsville, Mattoon, Neoga, Newton, Shelbyville, Sullivan, Toledo and Tuscola.

Sarah Bush Lincoln Fayette County Hospital is located in Vandalia and primarily serves the residents of Fayette County. It also operates provider clinics in Vandalia.

In accordance with its mission to provide exceptional care to all, Sarah Bush Lincoln provides care and resources to those who live in SBL's service area, regardless of their race, creed, sex, national origin, handicap, age or ability to pay.



Current Community Benefit Programs

Behavioral Health Services

SBL is one of few hospitals in east central and southern Illinois that provides inpatient adult acute mental health services, with approximately 900 admissions per year.

SBL also provides outpatient psychiatric evaluation and follow-up services to children, adolescents and adults struggling with mental illness and behavioral disturbances. SBL's Employee Assistance Program (EAP) provides counseling and psychoeducational support to employees and to household family members of organizations that contract with SBL for these services. Workshops, trainings and crisis debriefings are provided by EAP in workplace settings such as schools, healthcare, first responder or industrial sites.

In FY23, Sarah Bush Lincoln began its Integrated Behavioral Health (IBH) program, which provides consultation services to primary care providers who want to manage their patients' mental health needs in their offices. IBH staff provide chart reviews, focused patient assessments, psychological evaluations and treatment recommendations for patients enrolled in these services.

SBL Behavioral Health Services staff consists of psychiatrists, psychiatric nurse practitioners, licensed social workers and counselors, along with support from clinical and office staff. SBL provides inpatient and outpatient psychiatric services to east central Illinois as part of our mission to provide exceptional care for all and create healthy communities.

Peace Meal Senior Nutrition Program

The mission of Peace Meal is to provide quality meals for healthier lives. SBL's Peace Meal program helps seniors improve their nutrition, sustain their independence and enhance their quality of life by providing meals, fellowship and connections to other needed services. Through the provision of a balanced meal, nutrition education, daily contact with staff and referrals to other services, Peace Meal eases the impact of malnutrition and food insecurity among the aged population and provides a more stable nutritional foundation for the health and independence of its clients.

Peace Meal provides nutrition services throughout Clark, Coles, Cumberland, Douglas, Edgar, Moultrie and Shelby Counties. An average of over 900 meals per day are served, providing meals to almost 2,000 clients each year. SBL provides approximately 230,000 meals to residents in its service area each year.



Current Community Benefit Programs

Dental Services and Mobile Dental Clinic

Sarah Bush Lincoln Dental Services is a collaborative community effort that provides dental care at no cost to families who qualify. Patients must be between the ages of 0-18, qualify for Illinois Medicaid and live within SBL's service area.

SBL Dental staff consists of one full-time dentist, public health dental hygienists, dental assistants and clerical staff, as well as 14 volunteer and partnering dentists who provide dental services to patients whose needs are beyond the scope of the program.

The program reaches over 3,500 children in SBL's service area, providing diagnostic, preventive, restorative and surgical dental care as well as oral health education. In an effort to remove transportation barriers, the SBL Dental program visits approximately 70 schools with the Mobile Dental Clinic, where dental screenings and preventative services are performed. Follow up treatment is completed at the Fixed Site Dental Clinic in Mattoon, which serves as a comprehensive dental home to patients.



Healthy Kids Education

SBL's Healthy Kids Education program focuses on encouraging and supporting healthy lifestyle choices for children and families. Programs offered through Healthy Communities include:

- Healthy Kids Running and Reading Club
- Teen Cooking Classes
- Parent & Child Cooking Classes

Current Community Benefit Programs

Center for Healthy Living

Sarah Bush Lincoln opened the Center for Healthy Living in 2015 to achieve the following goals for patients with chronic conditions and those who desire to establish healthy lifestyle behaviors:

- · Enhance quality of life
- Manage chronic conditions
- Prevent avoidable hospitalizations
- Delay onset or reoccurrence of symptoms
- Support and help achieve individual goals
- Behavior modification
- Achieve a consistent fitness program
- Transition to a long-term community-based exercise program, including a YMCA membership at the Center for Healthy Living

Regular exercise is fundamental in chronic illness management, weight loss and overall health maintenance. It boosts immune systems, relieves stress, helps regulate blood pressure, cholesterol and blood sugar, increases lung capacity and metabolism and a whole host of other benefits.

Through the 3-month Healthy Living Medical Exercise program, participants receive a custom-designed exercise and lifestyle program to help them achieve their goals and manage chronic illness. The exercise program is tailored to their limitations and goals, with options and tools to make meaningful, positive changes. The overreaching goal is to instill lifelong healthy behaviors that foster independence and encourage participants to transition to a long-term community-based exercise program.

Evaluation of Prior Implementation Strategy

As part of the Community Health Needs Assessment, hospitals are required to provide an evaluation of the impact of the actions taken to address significant health needs that were identified in the immediately preceding CHNA. SBL's previous CHNA was conducted in 2021 with the implementation strategy covering fiscal years ending June 30, 2023 – June 30, 2025 (FY23-FY25). Based on the actions and results summarized below, SBL has met their goals for each strategy listed.

Priority 1: Maximize Access to Care

Goal 1: Expand access to mental health services

Strategies

- A. Implement integrated behavioral health in SBL primary care clinics
- B. Evaluate ways to address substance abuse issues associated with mental health

Actions and Results: Goal met

Sarah Bush Lincoln implemented its integrated behavioral health program in FY23. Since then, it has nearly tripled its initial annual visit volume. The program has been rolled out to all SBL primary care providers.

To address substance abuse issues, SBL collaborates with Gateway Hospitals, a group of rehab facilities that provide detox and rehab services for those with or without a co-existing mental health disorder. Gateway has a grant-funded program that allows them to deploy staff to community hospitals to assist patients who might benefit from their services. SBL also established a referral process with Hour House, located

in Charleston, which provides residential and outpatient substance abuse services in east central Illinois.

Goal 2: Improve patient access and service through the use of technology and other means

Strategies

- A. Evaluate expanding access through same day service and extended hours in clinic and outpatient settings
- B. Continue to evaluate and leverage telemedicine offerings to adapt to community and organizational needs

Actions and Results: Goal met

Sarah Bush Lincoln has five walk-in clinics located in Mattoon, Charleston, Effingham, Tuscola and Vandalia. The clinics are open 7 days a week, 7 am to 7 pm Monday – Friday and 7 am to 3 pm on Saturday and Sunday (Vandalia weekend hours are 8 am – 4 pm). In addition, some SBL providers offer appointments outside normal business hours.

SBL has several providers who offer telehealth visits for patients who have transportation issues or are not able to travel due to health issues. In addition, SBL partners with specialty care providers who deliver services via telehealth as needed for high-acuity patients who are hospitalized.

In FY24, Sarah Bush Lincoln added an action plan to improve digital access for patients wishing to schedule appointments with SBL providers. SBL implemented a self-scheduling system in January 2025, which allows patients to schedule appointments with their primary care provider online, at their convenience. Work to implement self-scheduling for other services is ongoing.

Goal 3: Expand access to care for underserved populations

<u>Strategies</u>

- A. Recruit physician specialists to grow current and establish new service lines
- B. Evaluate and implement new services and programs to address obesity and chronic disease, such as bariatrics and a heart failure program
- C. Update medical staff development plan that will guide provider recruitment to meet the needs of the community

Actions and Results: Goal met

Sarah Bush Lincoln has been very successful in recruiting additional physicians and advanced practice providers to deliver medical care in its service area. Between FY23-FY25, SBL increased the size of its employed medical staff by 33%. This provides greater access to quality healthcare for more patients, close to home.

Sarah Bush Lincoln began offering bariatric services in FY23. Since that time, SBL surgeons have performed over 100 bariatric surgeries. In FY25, SBL launched an outpatient Congestive Heart Failure (CHF) clinic and has improved post-hospital discharge follow-up access in order to see patients more timely after a CHF exacerbation. These and other actions during the FY23-FY25 time period have resulted in SBL CHF readmission rates that are better than the state and national rates.

Sarah Bush Lincoln updated its medical staff development plan in FY25. The plan identified current and projected levels of medical providers

needed throughout SBL's service area and is used to support provider recruitment efforts. The plan will be updated on an ongoing basis.

Priority 2: Address Social Determinants of Health

Goal 1: Promote economic stability to address social determinants of health in SBL communities

Strategies

A. Participate in and support programs that promote economic development in SBL communities

Actions and Results: Goal met

Sarah Bush Lincoln is proud to support economic growth and long-term stability in the communities it serves. During FY23-FY25, SBL joined Rural King and other local businesses and organizations in the development of Emerald Acres, a 150-acre development featuring indoor and outdoor sport facilities and new retail stores, restaurants and hotels which are projected to generate \$24 million in direct spending annually.

Each year, Sarah Bush Lincoln supports community organizations that serve residents, strengthen local businesses, and drive local economic growth. In addition, Sarah Bush Lincoln supports economic stability by being the largest employer in its service area, employing over 3,400 people.

Evaluation of Prior Implementation Strategy

Goal 2: Sustain existing SBL programs that address social determinants of health

Strategies

- A. Provide access to healthy food options for seniors through the Peace Meal program
- B. Provide dental care to children at no cost to families who qualify
- C. Provide a 120-day program through the Center for Healthy Living for participants to receive a custom-designed exercise and lifestyle modification program

Actions and Results: Goal met

For many years, Sarah Bush Lincoln has provided programs that address social determinants of health for people in its communities.

SBL's Peace Meal senior nutrition program improves the nutritional status of older adults through providing meals, nutrition assessments and education and information about other community services that support their well-being. Between FY23-FY25, SBL provided almost 670,000 meals to clients in its service area through home-delivered meals and congregate sites, a 28% increase over the previous 3-year period. In addition to providing meals, Peace Meal staff and volunteers offer social interactions and daily safety checks to many seniors who live alone. While donations are accepted, participants are not turned away based on an inability to donate.

In the late 1990s, SBL partnered with community members to identify unmet health needs in its service area. Dental care for children with Medicaid was identified as one of the largest needs. As a result, SBL began its dental program and has provided services for over 20 years.

Between FY23-FY25, the SBL Dental Program served an average of 3,500 patients annually, and provided over 20,000 visits in total. During the 2023-2024 school year, SBL Dental Services provided services to children in 62 schools throughout SBL's service area via its mobile dental clinic and portable dental equipment. Organizations that partner with SBL Dental Services include elementary and secondary schools, local health departments, the Regional Office of Education #11, Lake Land College and other vital community partners.

The Center for Healthy Living (CFHL) staff includes exercise specialists and a dietitian who provide personal training services and health and nutrition coaching. It is also a fitness center open to SBL employees and YMCA community members who elect to use the CFHL location. During the FY23-FY25 period, the CFHL experienced growth in its services:

- A 30% increase in member check-ins
- A 31% increase in total memberships
- A 41% increase in YMCA members choosing to use its facility
- A 78% increase in medical exercise program completions
- A 229% increase in personal training sessions

Hospital Discharges

Sarah Bush Lincoln Health Center is located in Coles County in east-central Illinois, between the cities of Mattoon and Charleston. The total population in its 10-county service area is estimated at 207,784 people in 2024.

SBL is the single largest provider of acute care services in its 10-county service area. Other hospitals in the service area include St. Anthony's Hospital in Effingham County, Horizon Health in Edgar County, Good Shepherd Hospital in Shelby County and Sarah Bush Lincoln Fayette County Hospital in Vandalia.

The majority of SBL's hospital discharges come from Coles County, which is SBL's primary service area. The breakout of hospital discharges by the patient's county of residence is shown in the table in the next column.

Hospital discharges by zip code are shown in the column on the far right. Over 26% of SBL's hospital patients come from Mattoon while almost 21% of its patients come from Charleston.

Outpatient Visits

Sarah Bush Lincoln provides the vast majority of its services on an outpatient basis. In fact, in 2024, approximately 97% of patient encounters at SBL were outpatient visits.

Almost 40% of outpatient visits in 2024 came from Coles County. SBL also has a large outpatient presence in Effingham County, with several primary care and specialty care clinics. Over 12% of SBL's outpatient visits are from Effingham County.

The breakout of outpatient visits by the patient's county of residence is displayed in the table in the next column. Outpatient visits by zip code are displayed in the column on the far right.





The US Census Bureau estimated the 2024 population for SBL's 10-county service area at 207,784 people.


Coles and Effingham Counties have the largest populations. The other eight counties in SBL's service area have populations that are generally in the range of 10,000-20,000 people.





Population by gender is fairly evenly distributed in each county of SBL's service area with the exception of Fayette County, which has a larger male population (55%) to female population (45%).


Community Demographics: Population by Age Group












Community Demographics: Population by Race







Community Demographics: Population by Ethnicity and Language Spoken at Home






The ethnicity of the population in Sarah Bush Lincoln's service area is predominantly non-Hispanic or Latino. Douglas County's Hispanic/ Latino population is about 3 times the average in SBL's service area, but still less than half of the State and US rates.

Similar to race, ethnicity can influence health through key factors such as socioeconomic status, access to healthcare, mortality rates and chronic disease.

Douglas County also has the highest percentage of population who speak a language other than English at home, on par with the State and US rates. Moultrie County also has a much higher rate than average in SBL's service area. Language barriers can pose significant challenges in effective communication while providing healthcare.

Community Demographics: Births and Deaths



Over the past 10 years, the number of births in Sarah Bush Lincoln's service area has declined by 10%.

While the number of deaths fluctuated between 2013-2019, deaths increased by 15% in 2020 and have remained at least 10% higher than the number of deaths in 2019.

Several counties saw steady declines in the number of births throughout the 10-year period.






The detailed breakout of deaths per county between 2013-2022 does not show the same steady trends as the number of births displays.

The leading causes of death in Sarah Bush Lincoln's service area are heart disease and cancer, which together accounted for 40% of deaths in 2022.








































Early childbearing is associated with adverse health outcomes for mothers and their children, including a higher risk of complications such as preterm birth, low birth weight and maternal, neonatal and infant mortality.

From 2017-2023, the rate of births to teen girls ages 15-19 were lowest in Coles County and highest in Edgar and Fayette Counties.

From 2017-2023, the percent of births with low birthweight ranges from a low of 6% in Douglas County to a high of 10% in Edgar County. Low birth weight is an important public health indicator that can be used to assess maternal health, nutrition, healthcare delivery, and poverty.


In SBL's service area, about 1 in 4 adults reported that they did not have any leisuretime physical activity in the last 30 days.










Cholesterol screening is important because high cholesterol, a common but often silent condition, can lead to plaque buildup in arteries, increasing the risk of heart attack and stroke.




























Access to health care requires access to providers, which can be limited in rural areas.

In SBL's service area, the ratio of physicians to people is comparable to the state and national rates in Coles and Effingham Counties. In other counties, the ratio can be 2 to 7 times those rates, indicating less access to physicians in those counties.








Food insecurity is defined by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) as a household-level economic and social condition of limited or uncertain access to adequate food. The condition occurs when at least one member of the household lacks access to enough food for an active, healthy life because of limited money or other resources.

In SBL's service area, the percentage of the population who lack adequate access to food ranges from 12% to 17%.

The total number of people in SBL's 10-county service area affected by a lack of adequate access to food is over 28,000 people.




SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) is a US Department of Agriculture program that provides food benefits to low-income families so they can afford nutritious food.

To qualify for SNAP in Illinois, recipients must be at or below 165% of the poverty line. In SBL's service area, roughly half of food insecure people do not qualify for SNAP.

School lunch programs substantially reduce childhood food insecurity. Children can receive low or no-cost nutritionally balanced school meals to help support development and a healthy lifestyle. In SBL's service area, roughly half of the children in public schools qualify.






When child care is affordable and accessible, it can increase opportunities for families to earn income and healthcare benefits. When child care expenses are a burden, families often face choices between it and things such as doctor visits and healthy foods.

In SBL's service area, child care costs for a household with 2 children take, on average, 21% to 33% of the median household income. Historically, the Department of Health and Human Services has considered child care affordable if the expense consumes less than 10% of household income. In addition, child care can be limited due to a lack of centers providing it.




When households spend the majority of their incomes on housing, they often face difficult trade-offs in meeting other basic needs such as doctor visits, healthy foods and reliable transportation.

In SBL's service area, between 6% to 12% of households spend 50% or more of their income on housing. In some counties, this is significantly better than the Illinois and US rates.

Good health also requires safe housing. The percent of households in SBL's service area with at least one problem (overcrowding, high costs or lack of kitchen and/or plumbing facilities) ranges from 7% to 14%, which is also better than the Illinois and US rates.








Access to reliable, highspeed broadband internet also improves access to education and employment opportunities and is associated with increased economic development.


In SBL's service area, the vast majority of households have a computer, and more than 4 of every 5 households have a broadband internet subscription.





Discrimination and segregation can impact health by limiting access to quality healthcare and healthy environments, inflicting stress from living in disadvantaged areas and limiting socioeconomic opportunities.

Residential segregation is an index that represents the degree to which two or more groups live separately from one another in a geographic area. The index ranges from 0 (complete integration) to 100 (complete segregation). Data are not reported for counties with a Black population less than 100.

The school segregation index ranges from 0 to 1, with lower values representing school composition that approximates race and ethnicity distributions in the state populations within the county.

Ensuring the safety of drinking water is important in preventing illness, birth defects, and death due to pollution. Other health problems have been associated with contaminated water, including nausea, lung and skin irritation, cancer, infection, and birth defects.

Between 3%-10% of community water systems experience a violation each year. In 2023, 4 of the 10 counties in SBL's service area reported a health-based drinking water violation.

The environment a person lives in can significantly impact their health, both positively and negatively. Exposure to pollutants like air and water contamination can lead to health issues such as respiratory problems, cardiovascular disease and mental health challenges. Access to clean air and water and a healthy living environment are crucial for maintaining good physical and mental wellbeing.

Air pollution is a measure of the average daily density of fine particulate matter. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has primary annual average standards of 12.0 micrograms per cubic meter.

Air pollution in SBL's service area is on par with the State rate, which is higher than the US rate.

Methodology and Overall Results

In 2024, Sarah Bush Lincoln developed and implemented a plan to complete its triennial community health needs assessment.

In April 2024, links to an online survey were shared with community members via SBL's website and social media platforms. In addition, links were emailed to SBL employees and employees of area service agencies, who have working relationships with SBL's Healthy Communities programs. The goal was to obtain insights from members of the community to better understand the health needs of people living in SBL's service area and the social determinants that have the largest impact on their health.

Survey respondents were asked to rank 8 health needs in order of greatest need and 10 social determinants of health in order of greatest impact on the health of the people in their community. Respondents were also given open-ended questions to obtain their thoughts on what can be done to address the needs.

In April and May 2024, community meetings, that were advertised and open to the public, were held in each of the ten counties in SBL's service area. The meetings allowed SBL staff to dive deeper into key themes that were appearing in the survey results. Input was also obtained by collecting responses to questions on community boards that were placed in public locations in SBL's service area.

Survey results were aggregated and reviewed both at the overall 10-county service area level and at the individual county level.

Reports for each area are included in the following pages of this report.

2024 Community Health Needs Assessment

Implementation Strategy

Information in Sarah Bush Lincoln's 2024 Community Health Needs Assessment was reviewed by SBL management team members, physician leaders and the Board of Directors during SBL's triennial strategic planning process in October 2024.

The output of the strategic planning process was a detailed list of strategic objectives and action plans that will guide the activities of the organization during the FY26-FY28 time frame, beginning in July 2025 and carrying through until June 2028.

SBL objectives and action plans that align with the greatest health needs and social determinants of health in the communities it serves are outlined as follows:

Priority 1: Maximize Access to Care

Goal 1: Expand access to mental health services

Strategies

- A. Optimize integrated behavioral health in SBL primary care clinics
- B. Leverage internal and external partnerships to provide behavioral health services, including addressing substance abuse

Goal 2: Improve patient access and service through the use of technology and other means

Strategy

A. Implement digital front door strategies such as self-scheduling, pre-registration systems, patient portal, patient messaging, etc.

Goal 3: Expand access to care for underserved populations

Strategies

- A. Grow service lines in the Effingham, Fayette and Tuscola regions
- B. Expand services available at SBL Fayette County Hospital
- C. Update SBL's medical staff development plan that will guide provider recruitment to meet the needs of the community

Priority 2: Improve Health Status

Goal 1: Improve care for patients with chronic health conditions or factors that place them at higher risk for poor health

Strategies

- A. Develop multi-disciplinary approaches to recognize at-risk patients and deploy care strategies to reduce readmissions

- Develop work plans to support effective implementation
- Create mechanisms to monitor and measure outcomes
- Provide on-going status reports and results of these efforts to improve community health

Sarah Bush Lincoln Health Center is committed to conducting another health needs assessment within three years.




